<b>Approximate size</b>	For example, 20cm x 15cm, or compare to a part of your body	
<b>It shows images of</b>	Animals, people, flowers, landscape, patterns, letters and numbers	
<b>Its condition</b>	Undamaged, broken, burnt, stained, rusted, repaired, repainted	
<b>It is/was used</b>	For entertainment, for trade, for transport, for navigation, for building	
<b>It was found in</b>	Australia, Europe, near Perth, in the North West of WA	
<b>It was used by</b>	Rich people, men, women, people doing a certain job	
<b>It last belonged to</b>	Name of ship or person	
<b>It is dated at</b>	For example 17 <sup>th</sup> Century, 1798, 1800s
