## Olden Days, School Ways

### Years K-3

Duration: 45 mins (approx.)

*Historical knowledge and understanding; Historical skills*

Ring the bell to start the lesson, practise writing on slates and be on your best behaviour at all times! Take a walk down memory lane to learn about school, work and play for children in the past. Extend your experience by borrowing our old school games to play during your visit including ropes, knuckle bones and potato sacks.

### Year 4

## Strangers on the Shore

### Year 5

Duration: 1.5 hours (approx.)

Available 10am and 12pm sessions only

*Historical knowledge and understanding; Historical skills*

Relive the experience of the Swan River Colony's first European settlers.

Delivered outdoors\*, this fully facilitated program provides insight into the challenges that new colonial arrivals faced trying to establish secure shelter and food.

Students will consider survival, priorities and planning as they build a makeshift shelter where the first colonial camp might have been. What impact did their arrival have on the local environment and the Aboriginal peoples who have lived here for tens of thousands of years?

## Now and Then

### Years K-2

Duration: 20 minutes (approx.)

*Historical knowledge and understanding; Historical skills*

Go on a matching mission to find the olden day equivalent to everyday items.
