

We found some old knucklebones in the toy trunk. Our dog seemed to like them too!






Discovery Centre

Things to do at home

Try some of these games at home with family or friends. All of them are quick, cheap and simple to make and play.

- Have a competition to see who can make the most interesting thing out of a sheet of newspaper.
- Memory tray: Place about 12 small items on a tray and ask a friend to look at them for one minute. Your friend then closes their eyes and you remove one or two objects. Your friend then opens their eyes and has to guess what's missing.
- Ask someone you know how to play Noughts and Crosses, also known as Tic-Tac-Toe. Make a 3D version by drawing a grid in the sand and using nuts and leaves.
- Make up a skipping rhyme and use long piece of rope to skip up a storm.



- Have an Egg and Spoon Race using a dessert spoon and egg. If you don't want a sticky mess, boil the eggs first!
- + Have a sack-race (make sure you play this on grass).
- · Use a lamp to create shadow puppets on the wall.
- · Draw a hopscotch game on your patio with some chalk.
- Play Sticky Apple just like tag, except you must keep your hand on the body part where you were tagged while you become "it" and chase the other players.
- · Make sock puppets and put on a play for your family.







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
