

What is the New Museum Project?


This \$395.9 million project will deliver an extraordinary New Museum including:

Building design features

- Bold, distinctive and contemporary design that both frames and links the existing heritage buildings.
- Highlights and expresses visitor movement routes on the exterior of the building through a band of gold. This idea, like many in the design, was inspired the Museum's collection.
- Creates a landmark that incorporates open public spaces, inside and out, for day and night events, contributing to Perth's vibrant cultural life.
- Highly permeable, allowing views of activity within the Museum as well as providing spectacular views of the City. There will be multiple ways to enter and move through the site.
- Revitalised heritage buildings including opening previously closed spaces such as the Jubilee Building colonnade.
- Provides a range of different spaces including:
- Multiple entrances from major pedestrian thoroughfares to a central civic space
- Welcome to Country developed with the Whadjuk Nyoongar community
- Open and welcoming foyer space
- Dynamic and flexible galleries
- Multipurpose spaces for programming and functions
- Studios for lifelong learning
- New venue, retail and café spaces
- Spectacular new display of the blue whale.
