The Thaumatrope

Instructions

- 1. Carefully cut out the circles.
- 2. Colour the bird in. It is best to use the darker shades of colour rather than the lighter ones.
- 3. Paste the reverse sides of the bird and the cage together making sure that the bird is UPSIDE DOWN in relation to the cage.
- 4. Use a hole punch to punch 2 holes where marked.
- 5. Thread rubber bands through the holes, looping each band back into itself to secure.
- 6. Hold one loop in one hand and the other loop in the other hand.
- 7. Twirl the traumatrope 20-30 times around and pull tight spinning the card rapidly.

You can make your own design on the blank circles. Other ideas for images to combine are clockface and hands, or a ship and bottle.

What do you see?

The thaumatrope was first described by Dr Paris in 1826. It works because of persistence of vision. The thaumatrope was the first in a long line of devices which work on this principle. Thaumatropes were popular children's toys in the 19th century.
